
Cape sailors take a breatner from the battle



Durban yachtsmen lead Lipton Cup in cliff-hanger race

AS THE 1985 Lipton Cup Challenge fleet goes into the final race today, the whole series is a cliff-hanger with two Durban yach's vying for first place overall.

The yachts are B2G2 of the Point Yacht Club and Element PGM of Natal University. Barring a disaster, one of these two yachts will win South Africa's most coveted yachting trophy.

Yesterday's race caused saw an upset with B2G2 disqualified for being over the line at the start. After one general recall and one single recall, which was ignored, the fleet got away well in a steady 8-10 knot north-easterly with a moderate

After the first triangle of the

Olympic course, the Cape yacht, Omega Heatwave, was leading B2G2 and Cape Columbine. The first seven yachts then pulled clear with Omega Heatwave moving into a controlling lead she did not lose.

Second over the finish line was Cape Columbine, followed by Galactica which took third place after B2G2 was disqualified. Then came Element PGM, Tatoosh and Haly-
